They've both increased daytime power over the years, with KCMN upgrading from 1-kw to 3-kw to an eventual 15,000 watts. Seller is DJR Broadcasting - Don Crawford, Junior, who learned the biz growing up around his dad. The buyer is Kona Coast Radio, which is the always-active Vic Michael, working out of Loveland, CO. Vic's licenses and construction permits range from Colorado to Kansas, Wyoming and South Dakota, and he also holds interests (through Cedar Cove Broadcasting) in a raft of non-commercial construction permits won in FCC auctions.
